1. Introduction

As an outcome of the *Leadership Australia – A New Generation Program*, the Australian Multicultural Foundation (AMF) has developed a resource guide. The guide is designed to assist young people in developing networks, ideas and opportunities to engage in community activities with the aim of promoting increased understanding of Australia's cultural diversity.

The resource is a working document and will evolve over time through the inclusion of regular additions and updates. It is not intended to be a complete document of resources available.

2. Leadership programs

Leadership Australia—A New Generation Program

Leadership Australia—A New Generation is a program initiated by the AMF and funded by the Australian Government Department of Immigration and Citizenship (DIAC). The aim of the program is to develop a group of confident and well connected young Australian Muslims who will be able to present the views of young Australian Muslims to the wider community. In addition, the program provides a unique resource for other young Muslims to seek mentorship and leadership within the community.

Seventeen young Australian Muslims from across Australia were selected to participate in the *Leadership Australia* program. Initially participants attended a three day intensive training course in Melbourne. The course components include leadership skills in mentoring, public speaking, communications, working with the media, community networking, innovation and entrepreneurship, conflict resolution and team building.

On returning home, participants are required to complete several tasks and to apply the knowledge and skills gained throughout the training course. The tasks are multifaceted and participants must:

- ∞ identify and contact a mentor who is prepared to support them in their endeavours
- initiate two public speaking engagements—one to a school and one to the general community
- ∞ arrange a personal media interview, including a daily or local newspaper/ journals or a radio station
- arrange a meeting with either the premier of the state, the Multicultural Affairs Minister or Parliamentary Secretary for Multicultural Affairs and Settlement Services with the aim of introducing themselves as a young person interested in being engaged within the community.

Other leadership programs

The following is a list of recognised leadership programs. The websites provide resources, information on other inspiring leaders with specific professional skills and ways to participate in community activities.

The Williamson Community Leadership Program is a challenging and enriching program which is delivered over 12 months through seminars, visits, field trips and lectures. 7. Volunteering

Volunteering makes an important contribution to the Australian way of life. Voluntary work meets needs, expands opportunities for democratic participation, personal development and recreation within a community and helps to develop and reinforce social networks and cohesion (ABS 2006).

While older age groups, particularly 34 to 44 year olds (who contribute to 42.7 per cent of volunteering efforts), are contributing more to volunteering than the 18–25 age group it is worth noting that the 18–25 year old aged group grew in their volunteer efforts from 17 per cent in 1995 to 29.6 per cent in 2006.
